UNITED NATIONS PEACEKEEPING OPERATIONS CONTINGENT COMMANDERS COURSE

This Institute for Security Governance (ISG) peacekeeping training course prepares participants to take on the roles and responsibilities of contingent, battalion, and sector commanders in complex peacekeeping operations, both for the United Nations (UN) and other multinational organizations.

COMPREHENSIVE APPROACHES TO COUNTER HYBRID THREATS

P179847/P319283

The course aims to identify and examine national, regional, and collective security capacities and capabilities requirements to support a comprehensive approach to countering hybrid threats. Participants will identify key government and private sector organizations, ministries, and law enforcement partners; consider political processes that promote or impede cooperation; explore new policies and cooperation frameworks; and analyze a cogent and reasonable methodology that supports operational and strategic understanding, willingness, collaboration, and, ultimately, execution of a viable approach to counter hybrid threats in the field.

NATIONAL RESILIENCE FOR DEFENSE & SECURITY

P179928/P319928

This course will orient participants to successful 'whole-of-government' resilience models, in which all facets of society contribute to keeping their nation safe, sovereign, and functional. It will emphasize planning considerations and capabilities requirements for countering full spectrum threats and hazards that target the civil population and their access to security, timely and reliable information, and essential goods and services.

ENERGY SECURITY & CRITICAL ENERGY INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION

P179929/P319929

This course aims to provide an increased awareness and understanding of the geopolitics of energy, threats to energy infrastructure, energy security in the maritime domain, the intersection of cybersecurity and energy systems, critical infrastructure protection, and cooperation among ministries and industry. The course is conducted in partnership with the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, for candidates from all IMET recipient countries.

INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY BUILDING FOR LOGISTICS

P179931

This course provides participants an opportunity to better comprehend and apply logistics management concepts and principles to build and strengthen their logistics institutional capacity. It examines eight logistics topics including logistics governance and operational planning.

DEVELOPING CYBER ORGANIZATIONS AND WORKFORCES

This course focuses on establishing an organization and workforce capable of conducting defensive missions in cyberspace takes careful, deliberate planning and collaborative relationships across a ministry and across government. It provides concepts and knowledge necessary to lead the development of an organization's cyber strategy, cyber policy, cyber budgeting, cyber acquisition, and cyber workforce.

HUMAN CAPITAL DECISION-MAKING FOR DEFENSE INSTITUTIONS

This two week resident course focuses on human resource management (HRM) concepts/principles to build and strengthen Partner Nation institutional capacity, with a focus on human capital decision-making. Participants will learn the importance of continuous assessment of HRM functions and institutions.

CIVILIAN HARM MITIGATION

P309542

This course assists those responsible for promoting security and addressing threats in armed conflict. In addition to promoting legal and humanitarian imperatives, civilian harm mitigation supports security goals and strengthens military effectiveness. Mitigating civilian harm is also an expectation and norm for a modern, professional military. Participants will learn how mitigating civilian harm can and should be integrated into many facets of military operations, with the opportunity to develop and practice strategies and techniques in breakout sessions and in response to historical case studies.

FACULTY

ISG has a diverse faculty team grounded in professional experience from academic, military, government, and civil sectors. The core faculty are augmented by experts drawn from other parts of government, and American and international subject matter experts drawn from universities, industry, think tanks, international organizations, and non-governmental organizations.

PROGRAMMING

Programming should be requested through your applicable NETSAFA Country Program Manager. Each country may request up to three quotas per resident course iteration. Additional seats may be available upon request.

FUNDING

ISG can accept most types of US Government funding. Courses are typically funded by IMET, FMF, FMS, CTIWFP/RDFP, PKO, and other DoD-wide O&M funds (333, 332, MSI, etc.). Cost estimates can be obtained by contacting ISG or the applicable NETSAFA Country Program Manager.
