In April 2019, The Institute for Security Governance (ISG) was established to build partner institutional capacity and capability, and to provide educational and professional development opportunities grounded in American values and approaches tailored to meet partner requirements.

Our Mission: ISG's mission is to advance national security and foreign policy objectives by building partner institutional capabilities and enhancing the approach and conduct of Institutional Capacity Building (ICB) to address security challenges.

Over the past two years, the Institute for Security Governance has focused on aligning ICB development, execution, and education within DSCA. Here is a brief summary of ISG's accomplishments in the pursuit of advancing ICB and security cooperation efforts:
