MANAGING INTERNAL CONFLICT

This course explores internal conflicts within a country such as insurgency, separatism, large-scale criminal violence, and ethnic, communal, or religious-based violence. Many countries confront these situations at home and abroad during peace operations. The course also addresses international issues that affect internal conflict, including the use of proxies or transnational ideologies. Throughout, participants learn and practice conflict analysis techniques, gain exposure to prevention and political-military response strategies, and discuss security sector capabilities needed for effective response.

OBJECTIVES

Participants will be able to:

- ◆ Develop a strong understanding of the origins and dynamics of internal violence
- ◆ Review and apply analytical tools for conflict analysis
- ◆ Investigate and apply approaches used to prevent and respond to internal violence
- ◆ Develop institutional reform proposals to equip national security forces to prevent and respond to violence
- ◆ Lead case studies and academic discussion to facilitate key concepts proliferation once participants return home

TOPICS

This course examines contemporary internal violence through plenary lectures, case studies, exercises, and individual/group work using learning techniques that promote constructive dialogue. The course is oriented at the conceptual and societal level of analysis and will not focus on tactical security techniques for confronting violence. Course topics may include:

- ◆ Causes and types of internal conflict
- ◆ Conflict analysis techniques
- ◆ Intervention approaches and strategies
- ◆ Conduct of domestic operations: civilian protection; law and human rights; working with intelligence and law enforcement agencies
- ◆ Conflict resolution strategies
- ◆ Conflict recovery: managing ex-combatants, transitional justice, and addressing ideology

PARTICIPANTS

This course material is highly relevant for participants who live in divided societies or may operate in areas facing violent divisions. Host governments in consultation with US Embassies are asked to draw participation from female and male and mid-grade to senior military officers and equivalent level civilian leaders. This course provides an excellent opportunity for cross-community engagement and the development of partnering skills.

ISG PROGRAM AREAS

ISG programming has been developed over 25 years by providing military and civilian officials with unique education and professional development programs. Courses are designed to cultivate individual understanding of complex issues, foster peer-to-peer learning, and build international communities of interest.

FACULTY
