The Institute for Security Governance (ISG) United Nations (UN) Peacekeeping Intelligence Operations Course prepares potential staff for intelligence functions with a UN Force or Sector Headquarters, or within a Joint Mission Analysis Center (JMAC) in a UN peacekeeping mission. The course meets current standards of performance established by the UN and includes best practices from other nations' peacekeeping operations (PKO) training.

OBJECTIVES

Upon completion of this course, participants will be able to:

- ◆ Explain the principles of United Nations Military Peacekeeping Intelligence (MPKI)
- ◆ Apply the peacekeeping-intelligence cycle at the operational level
- ◆ Understand key rules of international law relevant to UN MPKI
- ◆ Demonstrate the ability to develop and use basic UN MPKI analysis tools and support the Military Decision Making Process
- ◆ Examine MPKI products to conduct an analysis of the operating environment (AOE)
- ◆ Recognize the importance of MPKI in the protection of UN Mission Staff, UN agencies, and preempting attacks on civilians

TOPICS

The goal of this training is to improve the ability of national armed forces to participate in UN PKO in order to resolve international crises. The training methodology includes presentations from subject matter experts, group and plenary discussions, and classroom exercises. Group discussions and exercises focus on problem-solving in fictitious PKO scenarios or on standalone problems related to various aspects of PKO. Course topics may include:

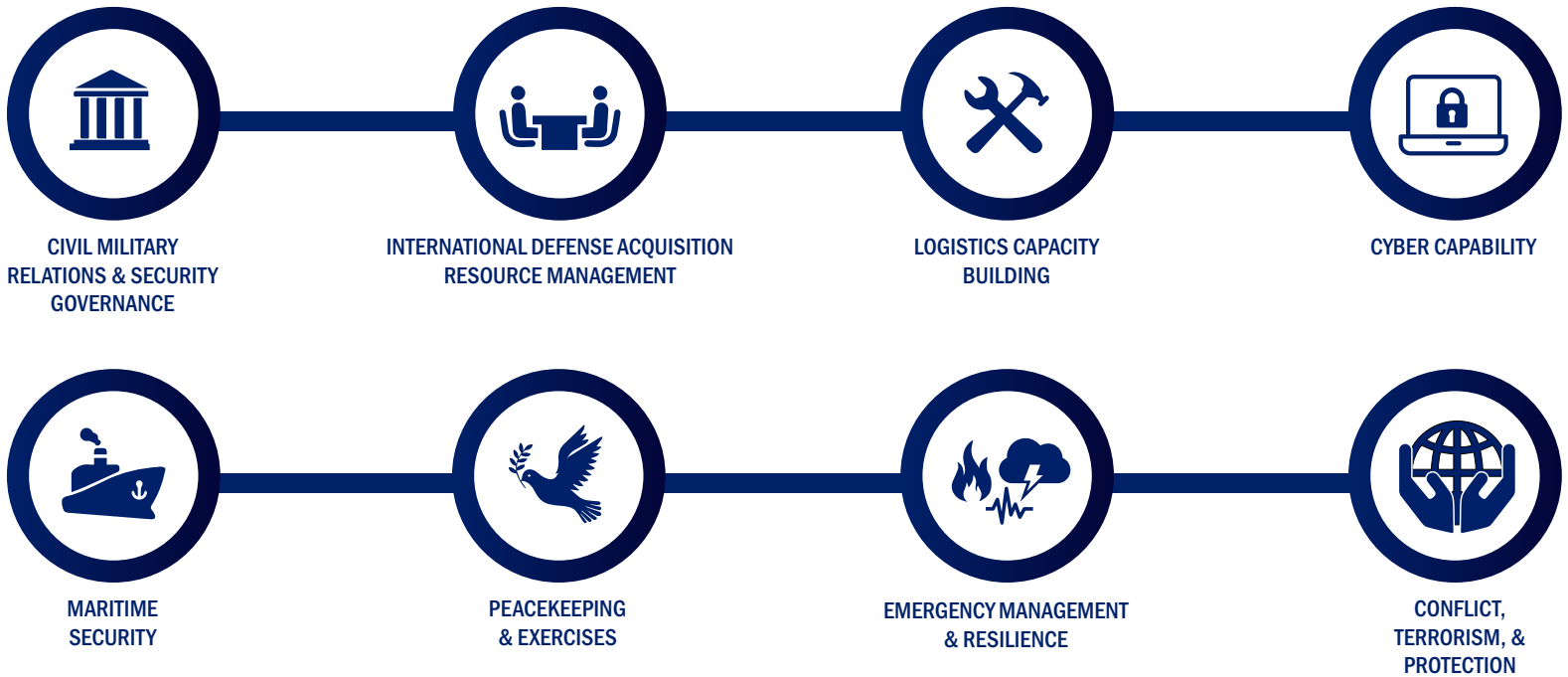
- ◆ United Nations Military Peacekeeping Intelligence Overview
- ◆ The UN Legal framework and UN MPKI
- ◆ MPKI Cycle and Intelligence Functions
- ◆ Analysis of the Operating Environment (AOE)
- ◆ MPKI Support to the Military Decision Making Process
- ◆ MPKI Support to Protection of Civilians Planning

PARTICIPANTS

Participant rank or grade should be O-3 to O-6 equivalents. The course targets those who will or may deploy as staff officers at a UN Force/Sector Headquarters within the military intelligence branch (U2/G2) or at Joint Mission Analysis Centers (JMAC), intelligence officers deploying with national contingents, or faculty/trainers assigned to peacekeeping training centers.

ISG PROGRAM AREAS

ISG programming has been developed over 25 years by providing military and civilian officials with unique education and professional development programs. Courses are designed to cultivate individual understanding of complex issues, foster peer-to-peer learning, and build connected networks of international peers through a professional learning environment.



FACULTY

ISG has a diverse faculty team grounded in professional experience from academic, military, government, and civil sectors. The core faculty are augmented by experts drawn from other parts of government, and American and international subject matter experts drawn from universities, industry, think tanks, international organizations, and non-governmental organizations.

ENROLLMENT

Courses are conducted as part of the US Government security cooperation efforts. Interested partner nation personnel should contact their government's international cooperation section, or the relevant US Embassy's security/military cooperation section for selection processes and enrollment. Interested US citizens may contact ISG to discuss availability.

FUNDING

Educational programs are primarily implemented through Title 22 authorized programs (International Military Education and Training, Foreign Military Sales, Peacekeeping Operations) and various Title 10 authorized programs such as the Maritime Security Initiative (MSI) and Regional Defense Combating Terrorism and Irregular Warfare Fellowship Program (RDFFP).
